Stage 1 at Huntley Berry Farm

During Term 4, Stage 1 students have been observing and learning about life cycles and how things come from farms and turn into products we use every day. A great local business that grows fruit and vegetables, sells its produce to Harris Farm Markets and turns some of its produce into jams and oil, is Huntley Berry Farm. Huntley Berry Farm is a not-for-profit business run by OCTEC. They are an Australian Disability Enterprise providing NDIS-supported employment to locals.

On Thursday 16th of November, all of Stage 1 visited Huntley Berry Farm. While at the farm the students learnt about the process the farm follows to grow their produce, as well as the variety of fruits and vegetables grown on the farm. The students got to plant some capsicum, taste a variety of fruits and feed the animals. Students were finally allowed to pick a punnet of strawberries to take home. The trip was enjoyed by all, with excitement filling the air all day. I encourage you to take your family to the farm during the January holidays when they will have a variety of berries and fruits in season to be picked.






Stage 2 - Visual Literacy

This term, Stage 2 has been identifying how pictures can tell a story, by studying the many features of visual literacy. Students have engaged with techniques such as shot types, colour, perspective, framing and reading pathways in order to read an image and decipher what is happening in an image. In the past 2 weeks, students have attempted to apply these concepts to multiple silent films, focusing on how music and sounds used help the viewer understand themes and meanings from the text. As part of these activities, students viewed the Pixar short film 'Bao' and had a go at identifying the main theme. They then set about picking the 14 main parts of the story and storyboarding them with a written explanation for each part. Have a look at some of their storyboards below.

Stage 2 Term 4 Sport – Basketball and Touch Football

This term, Stage 2 has been learning to play basketball (Year 3) and touch football (Year 4) with support from the NSW Sporting Schools program.

The NSW Sporting Schools initiative provides the opportunity to have professional coaches work with students to teach them the fundamental skills for participating in a range of sports.

As part of the program, Year 4 students have been working with the wonderful Jack and Cooper from Touch Football NSW to develop their ball handling and manoeuvring skills. During the sessions, the students have engaged in a variety of modified games including bullrush/touch rover, scoop relay, running lines and half-field touch. These activities have not only been a fun way to learn, but they have also provided a safe space for the children to build their ball skills and game confidence.

Our Year 3 students have been learning to play basketball with support from their school coaches, Mr Herbert, and Mr Bowtell. During each lesson, the students have been practising their dribbling, passing, and shooting techniques and have tested and developed their emerging skills and footwork through mini-games and targeted skill practise. Year 3 have particularly enjoyed the chance to play on a full court, with many of them able to hold their own using the skills they have learned.
