



# THRIVE CENTRE

#### Getting to know Mrs St Julian

At the start of the year we welcomed Mrs Kate St Julian as our new manager of the Thrive centre. I took a few moments to get to know her better and hear how she is settling in.

#### What is a brief history of your experience working in schools?

I started delivering Library services at The Fisher Library at Sydney University in 1996. Since then, I've worked at The Arthur Holt Library at Trinity Grammar School, which focused on Years 3 to 12. Before that I was at Woollahra Municipal Council Children's Library, Double Bay. During this appointment, I took leave to care for my sons, James Hugo and Henry. I have also consulted with Nepean Christian School, Mulgoa, in the establishment of their new Library.

#### What do you love about the Thrive Centre?

It is such an exciting space! Our catalogue contains a wealth of information and experiences; it is an incredibly important resource. While the core function is the support of the School curriculum, allowing students to develop the skills to explore a vast array of ideas and information, there is so much more. It is also a space where students and staff can come together to have fun, connect, interact and develop lasting relationships with people and books.

#### What has impressed you at OAGS?

My boys started at OAGS in 2020. This provided an insight into how schooling can be delivered in a positive and affirming way. I was impressed with the support structures placed around them and the willingness of teachers to drill down into their learning needs. I love the way the school is affirming of the teachings of Jesus, but provides a space for those who don't yet believe. This gives students the opportunity to discover other world views and to be challenged in their beliefs. What a great life skill to be able to listen to and discuss other points of view!




### PREP NEWS

#### **Connections**

Prep Dragonflies and Prep Caterpillar classes have been on a learning journey around the importance of cooperative and social learning.

Cooperative play and social learning helps children to develop social skills as they figure out how to negotiate group dynamics. Students learn how to collaborate and compromise with others, recognize and respond to others' feelings, share, show affection, resolve conflicts, and adhere to the rules. In turn, these important early lessons help children understand the roles and rules of society! This is very evident within the current teaching practice in our classroom. As teachers plan and implement provocations we draw on current pedagogy and use outcomes to guide children to reach learning goals.



#### Improves social skills

Having strong social skills will help young children succeed in many aspects of life. Through these interactions' children learn how to work together, solve arguments amongst themselves and establish friendships.

#### **Builds** confidence

Social play helps to build confidence. Often when children play together there is less direct adult supervision, meaning children cannot rely on an adult to tell them what to do - instead they have to organise themselves. This offers children the chance to gain confidence by thinking independently, taking on leadership roles and voicing their opinions.

#### **Develops emotional intelligence**

**Encourages teamwork** 

Social play helps to develop emotional intelligence and empathy which is just as important in later life as academic intelligence. Emotional intelligence is the key to forming good relationships with others, relationships which are vital to both personal and professional success later in life.

While some young children naturally work well as part of a team, others need more time to develop that ability. Social play, especially taking part in team games, encourages children to lead, or support their teammates, with a wealth of opportunities to share, take turns and show respect for others. It is a great way of encouraging children to learn and to practise all the skills that working together requires.

These skills are very much valued and demonstrated within our classroom and learning environments.

#### Secondary Study Skills

The word study (particularly in the lead up to examination periods) can bring with it negative connotations. And to be honest, it can be hard, because choosing to study requires self discipline and sacrifice as students prioritise learning over other appealing alternatives.

Studying however, can be a more positive experience when students know where to start and how to be effective. On Wednesday 15th February we invited Elevate Education, Australia's number 1 study skills provider, to come and run 3 study skills sessions with our Year 7, 11 and 12 students. These informative and engaging 1 hour seminars were tailored to meet the students age and academic needs. Study techniques like effective reading, note taking, memorising and practise papers were covered and examples of how these can be applied to a students' study routine were considered.





The event was well received by the students and there will be follow-up sessions at school as well as a second seminar on the 7th of June that will help students to consolidate their learning.


