#### Stage 2 Science

This term in Science, Stage 2 has been learning a lot about the lifecycle of a plant. Some of their learning has included:

- Growing a bean seed to observe the germination and growth process
- Dissecting a flower to examine the reproductive parts needed to aid pollination
- Completing a cross section of well known fruits and vegetables to identify and draw the seeds and parts
  of the produce

Below students can be seen documenting the timeline of bean seeds growth through detailed drawings. The Jack Jumpers loved being able to turn their observations of their own bean seed into a visual reminder of its growth. At the beginning of the term, we asked the question: Are seeds living or not living? When asked the same question again, it was encouraging to see students using the knowledge they had acquired to make an informed decision. Well done Stage 2!

#### Portraits in Stage 3



## SECONDARY NEWS

#### Y11 Physics - Preliminary Course students enjoying the beginning of 'boot camp'

The Physics Preliminary (Y11) and HSC (Y12) courses are intellectually stimulating, academically challenging, and very rewarding. I have been teaching Physics to Stage 6 students in NSW for ten years now, and each year I hear these sentiments from students. Though some students will select to study Physics with a particular purpose in mind (e.g. necessary prerequisite knowledge for an engineering degree at university), many take the course simply because they desire the conceptual challenges it offers.

Physics at OAGS enjoys a robust reputation and is on a strong growth trajectory in the coming years for the coming years.

'Boot camp' is the affectionate term I use to refer to the Physics Preliminary Course (Terms 1, 2, and 3 of Y11). Students are reassured that they will encounter challenges and frustrations as they are introduced to concepts and are taught new skills with which to solve unfamiliar types of problems. The reference to a military-style training environment is intended to convey the discipline necessary to achieve confidence and for students to anticipate – like new recruits – that though they may occasionally fall down in the mud, the most important thing is to get back up and continue with their training. (For the record, there is certainly no yelling or barking orders from me; please don't take the analogy literally!)

The photographs below are of Y11 students conducting guided first-hand investigations to verify some of the theoretical models they have been studying relating to static equilibrium and Newton's second law of motion.

#### **UNSW Farm Safety Research**

On Monday 13th March students from Year 7 participated in a project with researchers from the University of New South Wales. Through a grant from the Australian Government, researchers are designing a gamified educational tool for teenagers aimed at improving safety on farms and preventing unintentional injury. Our students participated via focus group discussions, sharing their thoughts around farm injury prevention and safety promotion.

Feedback from students will shape game development, and potentially experience testing of a game prototype prior to launch. Agriculture and computer studies teachers also participated in a teacher focus group to share their views around utility in the classroom. The game is expected to launch later this year.

#### **Meat Chickens Arrive**

The annual All Schools Royal Agricultural Society Meat Chickens Challenge has started with schools throughout the state receiving meat chickens on Tuesday 7th March. Students are vying for the honour of producing the best pair of male and female meat broilers at the Royal Easter Show. Weighing in at an average of 35 grams on day one, the birds gained an average of 148 grams in one week representing an average weight gain of 422 percent. Just imagine if that were you!!!!

The chickens are a key focus this term for Stage 5 Agriculture students who are studying the production of a chosen commodity from paddock to plate, or in this case the frying pan in Mrs Jewell's Year 7 Food Tech class! The Year 7 Mandatory Technology Agriculture class are also busy designing a housing unit suitable for the meat

birds and their egg laying friends.







#### Emma and Eden Fleece Junior Judging at Regional Competition

Last week students from Years 7-10 competed in the Blayney Junior Judging and Assessment Day.

OAGS fielded a team of 23 students and our standout performers were Year 10 student Emma Little and Year 7 student Eden Lyons.
