

Welcome to our new Prep Students

It has been a lovely start to the school year in our prep classes. Our students have been developing new friendships, getting to know their teachers and learning the class routines. The students have all settled into their classrooms well and we are all looking forward to learning together over the year.

We have welcomed Mr Bornen to the Prep teaching team. Mr Bornen has a passion for teaching our littlest students and is also taking on the role of assistant early stage one coordinator.

One highlight so far has been the water fun day. The students enjoyed running through the sprinklers, using our water tables, collecting water to throw at the teachers and then rolling in the sandpit. This form of play, while seeming fun and exciting to the students, teaches them concepts such as cause and effect (rolling in the sand when wet makes the sand stick to me), patience and perseverance (it takes a long time to fill a bucket from the sprinkler!) and risk taking (if I throw water at the teachers what will they do?). It was a truly fun, wet and sandy day.

Getting to know Mr Johnston

At the start of this year we welcomed Mr Dean Johnston as the Coordinator of Science & Mathematics in the secondary school. Dean joins the OAGS community with significant experience across many years of teaching in the Science faculty. An experienced Physics HSC marker, he has worked with students across a range of subjects to achieve strong results. I took a few moments earlier out of Mr Johnston's Wednesday, to get to know him better, and hear how he is settling in.

How long have you been teaching Science?

This is my tenth year. I started teaching Science at Newington College, Sydney, in 2013. Since then, I've worked in a number of schools, most recently at Kinross Wolaroi and before that at Barker College, Sydney, where I was an Assistant Coordinator of Science for three years.

What do you love about teaching Physics?

Physics offers the opportunity to explore the vastness of the material world, from subatomic quarks which combine to form protons to nebulae which birth the stars from which the elements are formed. Personally, I became hooked on physics when I was first taught Einstein's special theory of relativity in my HSC year. (Do you consider 'time' to be an absolute? Think again!)

What has impressed you in your first week at Orange Anglican Grammar?

What attracted me to OAGS, and has been affirmed in my time here already, is the desire of the teachers - and the students - to achieve

excellence in academic studies in the context of a vibrant, welcoming community. Also, as a Christian, it's a privilege to work in an organisation where the gospel of Jesus is properly yet sensitively shared, and where all are encouraged to seriously consider how the claims made by Jesus, as revealed in the Bible, are relevant to their lives.

What are you most looking forward to in Semester 1?

As a new teacher to the school, I'm looking forward to getting to know my students properly and for them to be enjoying the wonder and challenge that science offers.

Access The Thrive

Exciting opportunities will be available for students from next week in The Thrive Centre.

The Centre will be open on Monday and Tuesday afternoons for **secondary students** from Years 7-12 to drop in and Access help with their studies between 3.30 and 5pm.

Every **Monday**, Mrs Kimmins will be available to help individual students with English, History and Geography and every **Tuesday**, Mr Johnston will be available to help with Maths and Science.

Students are invited to come for part or all of the session and work on homework or assessment tasks, knowing help will be available in English, Maths, Science and H.S.I.E if required.

Students who do not wish help, but would like to complete their homework are most welcome to attend. There is no need, at this stage, to sign up for these sessions, just turn up.

The Learning Support staff will be available for **primary students** from Years 1-6 to **CCCCC** every morning before school from 8.00am - 8.50am. Help will be either given individually or in small groups in Literacy and Numeracy. Sessions must be booked by parents and may be done so by emailing the writer.

Year 7 and 10 Vaccinations

If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations. In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:


- 1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit: https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school
- 2. Follow the steps to log in to your existing Service NSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a Service NSW account, refer to Service NSW to create one.
- 3. Update or confirm your personal details in Service NSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:
- a) Enter your child's personal details
- b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child
- c) Read the linked Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement
- d) Provide consent

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school. The benefits of providing consent online:

- · easily update your child's details
- · receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- · faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

AG News

The first two weeks at the school farm have been flat out as alpaca and cattle teams prepare for the Royal Canberra Show at the end of the month. With three studs supplying the school with cattle - Elberta Limousins, The Trap Shorthorns and Macquarie Vale Charolais- our students have been training super hard to have the stock at their very best.

A huge thank you to Mrs Mel Flynn for donating hours of her time to clip the animals in preparation.

Our alpaca ladies are using animals from other studs at the Royal which is a huge reflection on the commitment of these students and Ms Sackey in establishing a presence in the alpaca industry.

Lots of new students have decided to try Agriculture as a new co-curricular activity, and it's very rewarding to see such enthusiastic faces. Our new students will take a break now until March when the team gets back from the Royal, however it's looking positive for a strong team into the future.

In the classroom, Stage 5 200 hours have been very busy collecting honey from the school hives as part of the paddock to plate project. Interestingly, despite the hives only being 10 metres apart, the honey colour varied from light to amber. It tasted very delicious, and the students will grade and weigh the honey before developing advertising and promotions campaigns.

Stage 5 200 hours have been working on a lamb feedlotting program as they prepare prime lambs for the lamb marketing program. Time to fire up the barbecue for slow roasted lamb with honey.

The senior agriculture class has kicked off the year by assessing the regeneration paddock soil health. This paddock was suffering from a low pH which had locked up nutrients in the soil profile. Our preliminary testing shows pH up to a very pleasing 6.5- 6.75 reflecting a significant improvement in soil health.

Year 7 are about to undertake their first ever major agriculture project so standby for some great photos in the

next newsletter.


